Cabinet and Ministerial Reshuffle

Following the General Election, Prime Minister David Cameron has formed a majority Conservative government and reshuffled his cabinet and ministerial teams. Key ministers for automotive include:

HM Treasury

- Chancellor of the Exchequer Rt Hon George Osborne MP
- Chief Secretary to the Treasury Rt Hon Greg Hands MP
- Exchequer Secretary to the Treasury Damian Hinds. This portfolio includes environment and transport taxation.

BIS

- Secretary of State for Business, Innovation and Skills – Rt Hon Sajid Javid MP
- Minister of State for Business and Enterprise Anna Soubry MP (attends Cabinet). This portfolio includes advanced manufacturing and low carbon vehicles.
- Minister of State for Trade Rt Hon Francis Maude MP
- Minister of State Ed Vaizey MP. This portfolio includes the digital economy.

DfT

- Secretary of State for Transport Rt Hon Patrick McLoughlin MP
- Parliamentary Under Secretary of State for Transport – Andrew Jones MP. This portfolio includes responsibility for OLEV, connected vehicles, environment and innovation.

DEFRA

 Secretary of State for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs – Rt Hon Elizabeth Truss MP

DECC

Secretary of State for Energy and Climate Change

 Amber Rudd MP

Labour leadership

Following Ed Miliband's resignation as Leader of the Labour Party last week, after heavy losses sustained in the General Election at the hands of the SNP, a leadership election will take place. Labour's National Executive Committee has announced that the party will select its new leader in mid-September, ahead of the party conference. The ballot will close on 10 September, with the new leader announced on 12 September. Labour's annual conference begins on 27 September. Liz Kendall, Yvette Cooper and Andy Burnham have all announced that they will stand for Labour's leadership, whilst Chuka Umunna, who declared his intentions to stand earlier in the week, has now withdrawn from the race.

£60 million for propulsion technologies

The Advanced Propulsion Centre (APC) is seeking proposals for projects led by businesses that will deliver significant reductions in CO_2 or other emissions. Business can apply for a share of £60 million to develop low-emission propulsion technologies. This is the fourth round of funding. Around £90 million has already been allocated to more than 50 organisations in the first three rounds. Projects must be based around one or more propulsion technology areas:

- internal combustion engines
- lightweight powertrain structures
- electric machines and power electronics
- energy storage and energy management
- alternative propulsion systems

ONS Labour Market Statistics

The Office for National Statistics (ONS) published its Labour Market statistics this week. The main findings of this release are that employment continues to rise and unemployment continued to fall. These changes continue the general direction of movement since late 2011. For January to march 2015, 73.5% of people aged from 16 – 64 were in work, up from 72.5% for a year earlier.
