Transport Minister welcomes rise in take up of ULEVs

Transport Minister Andrew Jones welcomed the substantial increase in the number of new ultra low emission vehicles (ULEVs) registered in the United Kingdom. A total of 9,046 ultra low emission vehicles were registered in the first quarter of 2015 - a rise of 366% from the same period in 2014. Transport Minister Andrew Jones said: "I am delighted to see such a huge rise in the number of people buying ultra low emission vehicles. The Go Ultra Low campaign is making low emission vehicles an increasingly popular choice and the government is investing £500 million over the next 5 years in making them more accessible to families and businesses across the country. It's a great example of Britain leading the way in developing sustainable transport options that are affordable for everyone." (Source: DfT)

Westminster Hall debate on air pollution in London

MPs debated air pollution in London and city regions this week at a Westminster Hall debate moved by Dianne Abbott MP. The Parliamentary Under Secretary for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs, Rory Stewart, responded on behalf of government. Key points of discussion included the importance of increasing the uptake of electric vehicles. MPs in attendance stated that the introduction of an ultra low emission zone was not happening soon enough and a number of MPs called on TfL to increase their expenditure on issues relation to air quality such as greater spending on cycle lane provisions.

CBI: June economic forecast

CBI released its economic forecast for June 2015 this week. The economy enjoyed a strong expansion last year, growing by an upwardly revised 2.8% (2.6% previously). But the economy started 2015 on the back foot, with the GDP print for 2015 Q1 surprisingly soft, rising by a modest 0.3% on the quarter—the slowest pace in over 2 years. The CBI expects growth to rally in the second quarter of 2015, with average rates of 0.6% a quarter thereafter. This leaves the forecast at 2.4% this year (2.7% previously)—having been pulled down by the weakness in the data in 2015 Q1—before continuing to rise solidly by 2.5% in 2016. Nonetheless, certain risks to UK growth remain. A difficult resolution of the Greek crisis could spark financial market and exchange rate volatility which could spill over into the real economy. And uncertainty ahead of the EU referendum raises the risk around the forecast of reduced sentiment and a delay in investment spending. On the domestic front, the risk of weaker-than-expected productivity growth continues to pose a threat to achieving durable economic growth. New online vehicle recall search tool to help motorists

The UK automotive sector, led by the Society of Motor Manufacturers and Traders (SMMT) and Motor Codes, has launched a new consumer-facing web portal to enable motorists to identify if their vehicle is on a safety recall list. Customers will also be directed to their nearest dealer so that any necessary remedial work can be carried out as quickly as possible. The Vehicle Safety Recall search tool, which operates using the Vehicle Identification Number (VIN), is a one-stop-shop for car owners and buyers of used cars and vans to check if the vehicle is subject to an outstanding safety recall that they, or a previous owner, may have missed. The new service is available online via Motor Codes (motorcodes.co.uk), the automotive industry's government-approved regulatory body, and is funded and managed by SMMT. (Source: SMMT)

David Cameron holds 'open and frank' EU talks

David Cameron has held what were described as "open and frank" talks with the Belgian prime minister over his plans for EU reform. Mr Michel said he respected the UK's decision to hold a referendum on its EU membership, but also warned against "discrimination of European employees" under any reforms to welfare. Mr Cameron has said he is "content" with the reception from leaders so far. The Prime Minister, who also spoke to his counterparts from Spain, Finland and Romania, is seeking support for his plan to renegotiate the UK's membership before holding an in-out referendum. He has said he wants to speak to all 27 EU counterparts about his agenda for reform and to set out the UK's intentions before they gather for next month's European Council meeting. Mr Cameron is pressing for changes including restrictions on welfare entitlements, greater powers for national Parliaments and an opt-out for Britain from the principle of "ever closer union". In the UK, the EU Referendum Bill passed easily on its second reading in the House of Commons this week. However, Foreign Secretary Philipp Hammond faced criticism from Conservative eurosceptics for abolishing the normal rules of Purdah, which prevents the civil service from playing any role in elections, and for potentially allowing the "Yes" side to spend more money.
